




Georgia's Growing Population 1.5 million Increase 2000-2010

2000-2009




Increasing Diversity and Challenges

- 9.4% of residents are foreign born
- 5.6% speak English less than "very well"
- 19.1% have no health insurance coverage
- 36.1% of homeowners' housing costs exceed
 30% of their income
- 14.6% of housing units are vacant

Georgia's Family Connection






- Network of government and nonprofits in all 159 counties

- Teen dropouts not working
- Children living in singleparent families
- Children living in families where no parent is in the labor force

- Adult education levels
- Unemployment in families with children
- Affordable housing
- Children in poverty and low-income families


- In 2020 more than 1.5 million Georgians will be aged 65 and older
- Growing older population will affect every facet of community life, including housing, transportation, employment, health care, social services and education
- 2008, Georgia Legislature passed Senate Bill 341 Project 2020: Georgia for a Lifetime
- Georgia Council on Aging charged to "address the needs of the expanding aging population"

Using the ACS to Monitor Conditions of the Older Population

From the Final Report "Georgia for a Lifetime," by Georgia Council on Aging

Georgia, when compared to other states in the nation, has relatively high rates of disability. Close to 30 percent of the 65-74 population has a disability and almost 60 percent of the 75+ population is living with a disability. Chronic disease and disability can be some of the biggest drivers of healthcare cost and largest determinants of quality of life.

Disability Rates and Type by Age, Georgia








- ACS data enable Division of Aging Services to allocate resources and better plan for delivery of services


Veteran Service-Connected Disability
